On the brink of nuclear war?

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Campaigns Officer **Sara Medi Jones** writes about the escalating tensions with North Korea and what we need to do to avert nuclear war.



T'S getting to be a familiar story with no satisfactory ending in sight. The United Nations Security Council called an emergency meeting earlier this week to once again discuss the international community's response to North Korea's continued development of its nuclear weapons system. Pyongyang tested what it claimed was a hydrogen nuclear bomb underground on Sunday. The United States government responded by threatening a 'massive military response'. South Korea carried out live-fire exercises on Monday, simulating an attack on the North's nuclear test site.

This is North Korea's sixth nuclear test; UN Security Council resolution 1718, passed in October 2006 after its first one, bans the country from undertaking any such activity. A new resolution is now expected to be adopted next week. While Prime Minister Theresa May has so far insisted that Britain's focus is on finding a 'diplomatic solution' to the crisis, the potential for war is a worrying possibility, especially with President Donald Trump and his notoriously erratic and often petulant behaviour in the mix.

CND unequivocally condemns North Korea's nuclear test. It is against international law, the wishes of the international community and all peaceloving people. Such tests are highly provocative and threaten a race towards nuclear proliferation. Pyongyang has previously asserted that its nuclear weapons programme is an act of 'self-defence', a stark reminder that nuclear weapons do not uphold international security and stability, but actually intensify political conflicts with

potentially disastrous consequences.

For the sake of global security, the response of the international community must be a redoubling of diplomatic efforts towards disarmament. CND has written to Prime Minister May with advice on the actions she could take to prevent a nuclear war.

The government should resolutely commit to not sending British armed forces to the Korean Peninsula. Military exercises only add to North Korea's sense of being under threat and could push tensions over the edge. Britain should support the offer from Switzerland to mediate talks with North Korea. Between 2003 and 2009, Six-Party Talks brought South Korea, North Korea, the US, China, Japan and Russia around the table. Diplomatic talks, rather than nuclear brinkmanship, are the only route to peace. Let's not forget the historic nuclear agreement with Iran. Despite being threatened by Trump, this is still a concrete success story of how diplomacy can stop a nuclear weapons programme.

And the final action Theresa May should take to avert nuclear war is to support the UN's global nuclear weapons ban treaty, which opens for signature on September 20th. Nuclear weapons will never be safe, in anyone's hands. And while they're still in existence, there is the very real threat of escalation, miscalculation or even an accident.

CND will deliver our demands to Downing Street later this month. The Chair of

> Parliamentary CND, Caroline Lucas, is also pressing the government to resolve the conflict using peaceful means through urgent questions in parliament. Refusing to work for peace is not an option now: any steps towards war could lead to our annihilation.

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
Peace Education in action

CND Peace Education Officer **Owen Everett** describes the difficult questions CND poses to students and what they learn from the answers.

F you had nuclear missiles, would you fire them? CND's Peace Education programme asks students just that. We put them in the shoes of leaders of key countries during the Cuban Missile Crisis of 1962, as part of our War Game lesson. The students have to determine what they would have done in the rapidly-changing situation.

The teaching pack that War Game comes from - Dial M For Missile - seeks to give students an understanding of the experience of citizens and world leaders during this pivotal moment in human history, and compare and contrast this learning with the situation today. Until the recent tension between North Korea and the United States, the threat of nuclear war was not something that today's students worried about. This is in stark contrast to older generations, who grew up during the Cold War.

We recently ran War Game with a Year 11 class at Southfields Academy, in London. It started with a quick



introduction to nuclear weapons and the Cold War. As tends to be the case, some students knew quite a lot already; others little to nothing.

In small groups, the students then took on the roles of leaders of the USA, Cuba, Soviet Union and UK. War Game works in rounds, with each exploring a significant development in the crisis, for example the US discovery of the nuclear missiles in Cuba. The groups then have a minute to decide on their country's course of action. One group opted to fire their missiles, to the shock of some of their peers. This prompted a discussion on Mutually Assured Destruction!

Some excellent points were made in the closing plenary discussion, including the value of negotiation. It certainly felt that CND Peace Education's central aim – to facilitate young people's critical thinking around nuclear weapons issues – had been met.

The students gave great feedback on the session, including: 'Super educational'; 'gave me greater understanding of what nuclear wars could do to the world'; and 'please come to Southfields again'.

This is in keeping with the feedback on the pack that we've had from teachers, including this from a review in *Teach Secondary* magazine: 'really engage[s] students in the political psychology and moral decision making of the Cold War era... This is a resource with a high I.Q., offering detail, challenge and real engagement, and in which students aren't taught what, but how, to think.'
