The Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament is incorporated as a company limited by guarantee (without share capital) no. 3533653. It is governed by its memorandum and articles of association. Every company member undertakes to contribute to its assets in the event of it being wound up while s/he is a member such amount as may be required not exceeding £1.

The Campaign is governed by an elected Council with policy decided by an Annual Conference of members. As well as the central organisation - which campaigns throughout England - there are a number of other CND organisations working regionally or in specialist areas. These organisations are entirely autonomous in their funding and decision-making and hence are not dealt with in these financial statements.

COUNCIL'S REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2002

The Council (which is the board of directors for company law purposes) presents its report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2002.

OBJECTS

The Campaign seeks nuclear disarmament by Britain and worldwide and to promote and advance the welfare of the human community by working for international peace and disarmament and a world in which the vast resources devoted to militarism are redirected to the real needs of the planet and the human community.

POLICIES ADOPTED

Its principal campaigning activities are to inform, educate and lobby to achieve its objects. CND publishes periodicals and reports; it sends regular briefings to and meets with MPs; it lobbies UK ministers, ambassadors, diplomats, academics and opinion formers, both in person and by letter; it informs and educates its members and encourages them to take action; it holds street stalls and exhibitions, and distributes leaflets and other materials, to inform the public on nuclear issues; it sends representatives to international disarmament conferences; it maintains contact and liaises with other organisations including regional and local groups within the UK, like-minded organisations in Europe and elsewhere, and specialist and expert organisations worldwide; it produces a schools pack, other educational materials, and provides speakers. At all times, it informs the media about its activities.

ORGANISATION OF THE CAMPAIGN

CND's annual conference is the policy-making body, establishes CND's strategy and sets priorities for the coming year. CND Council is the Board of Directors and is responsible for the implementation of policy as set by the Conference and meets three times a year. It monitors CND's finances and makes major financial decisions. Fifteen members of Council are directly elected by the AGM, and there are also representatives from the regions and specialist sections, as defined in Part 2 of CND's Regulations.

CND's staff work as a team, under the guidance of the Administration and Finance Group, and the Campaigns Group, which both meet four times a year. The Administration and Finance Group monitors financial performance against the budget, oversees fundraising, ensures that financial systems and controls are being followed and sets the budgets, including considering any amendments to the budgets, which are then approved by Council. It reports to Council. The Campaigns Group considers the details of campaigning programmes and ensures their integration with membership, fundraising and international work.

The Company has no issued share capital or debentures, hence there are no directors' interests requiring disclosure.

REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES

For much of the year CND's activities were similar to those in previous years but, as the year progressed, campaigning significantly increased on the proposed war against Iraq. CND worked with Stop the War Coalition and the Muslim Association of Britain to hold major national demonstrations against the war at Easter and in September. In December CND took the momentous decision to challenge the UK government over the legal authority to go to war against Iraq, for which it won much praise, although it ultimately lost the case. Many donations were received to help pay for the legal costs and thanks are due to solicitor Phil Shiner, barristers Rabinder Singh QC and Charlotte Kilroy and Mark Thomas for their commitment to this action, which inspired others across the world.

COUNCIL'S REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2002

Opposition to the UK Trident nuclear weapons system continued through supporting activities at Faslane where the weapons are based and through events in and around Plymouth, where HMS Vanguard is undergoing a re-fit. Lobbying, letter writing, street campaigning, touring, blockades, local meetings and demonstrations have all been employed on this and other campaigns. Developments at AWE Aldermaston were also monitored. CND attended the NPT Review Conference in New York and widely distributed information on the UK's record on nuclear disarmament. The Chair addressed the conference on behalf of NGOs calling for progress towards nuclear disarmament. This was reinforced in the UK by visits to Embassies.

Campaigning against Missile Defence continued during the year with a London demonstration at Easter, Yorkshire public meetings, and stunts at Fylingdales. Despite these efforts, the US withdrew from the ABM Treaty in June, the legal prelude to work on Missile Defence. CND was represented at the Global Network Against Weapons and Nuclear Power in Space Conference.

NATO and its nuclear policy is also a target and CND promotes European security based on the OSCE rather than military alliances. It has attended several international meetings, including the European Social Forum in Florence, is active in the development of a European Network for Peace and Human Rights, and is working closely with European, especially French, anti-nuclear campaigners. It remains concerned with international issues relating to nuclear issues and has issued statements, produced briefings and written letters on Israel and Palestine, India and Pakistan, and other matters.

CND ended its involvement with the stakeholders' dialogue involving BNFL following the announcement of the go-ahead for the Sellafield Mox plant. CND continues to be represented on the highly relevant Plutonium Working Group. CND works with other "Green" NGO groups in its campaign against the production of plutonium at Sellafield.

Much activity took place at local level, increasing awareness of and interest in peace issues and CND. CND assists local groups and activists through the provision of advice, encouragement, leaflets and other campaigning materials and continues to work with its supporters in Parliament. It maintains regular contact with MPs, raises issues of concern and produces briefings, and seeks to influence the policy-making processes of the political parties. CND organised, with other peace organisations, an event at the Labour Party Conference.

Membership and fundraising activities have been boosted by the support of a number of musical and entertainment celebrities, who have been notably vocal in their opposition to the war in Iraq. Such profile raising, press work and campaigning against the war in Iraq has led to an increase in membership later in the year.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

Although CND's involvement with opposition to the war in Iraq is vital, in 2003 the emphasis will revert to CND's key priorities: Trident, Missile Defence, NATO and Europe, and the plutonium economy. The links between the war in Iraq and these campaigns will be emphasised. CND will continue to work with other campaigning organisations and groups to achieve its objectives. Plans are already underway for a blockade of Faslane, a summer tour against missile defence, and representation at the NPT Preparatory Committee meeting in Geneva.

CND will continue to organise a broad range of activities involving its staff, regions, groups and members, with actions at places related to nuclear issues. It will send representatives to international conferences, the Labour and Liberal Democrat party conferences, trade union conferences and many other events.

CND's major push on fundraising and membership recruitment will continue. Fundraising, recruitment and profile raising will be maintained through CND's presence at festivals and events as well as other activities. Effort to establish a charitable trust to support educational work will continue.

CND is committed to maximise to the full its use of its resources, including its staff, members, and investment in information technology equipment. It will continue to develop its publications, especially its website (<http://www.cnduk.org>).

VOLUNTARY HELP AND DONATIONS IN KIND

CND is very grateful to a large number of volunteers, both in the National Office and in regional offices, who put in large amounts of work. All the Officers are volunteers, despite the time commitment entailed, and many regional offices are run entirely by volunteers. While all volunteers are entitled to claim travel and email expenses many do not do so, or claim only a small percentage. Equally many do not demand reimbursement of telephone, postal and other expenses incurred when working from their homes. These contributions are invaluable and much appreciated. CND is also particularly appreciative of the fundraising efforts of local groups and of the legacies it has received from supporters.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The results of the year's operation are set out in the attached financial statements. The retained reserves at 31 December 2002 amount to £195,426.

Full details of the income and expenditure are shown on page 6 and the supporting notes. All assets are held in support of the Campaign's objects and the Council considers that the financial position at the year-end was satisfactory.

STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE PREPARATION OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The Council is required by law to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the financial activities of the Company and of the income and expenditure of the Company for that year. In preparing those financial statements the Council is required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently,
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements,
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in business.

The Council is responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Company and enable it to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. It is also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

PREPARATION OF THE REPORT

This report has been prepared in accordance with the provisions of Part VII of the Companies Act 1985 relating to small companies.

AUDITORS

The auditors, Gotham Erskine, have indicated their willingness to continue in office and offer themselves for re-appointment at the next Annual General Meeting.

**INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF
CAMPAIGN FOR NUCLEAR DISARMAMENT**

We have audited the financial statements of Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament for the year ended 31 December 2002 set out on pages 6 to 13. These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective June 2002) and under the historical cost convention and the accounting policies set out on page 8.

Respective responsibilities of Council and auditors

As described in the Statement of Responsibility for the Preparation of the Financial Statements on page 4, the Council members, who are the directors of Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament for the purposes of company law, are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards.

Our responsibility is to audit the financial statements in accordance with relevant legal and regulatory requirements and United Kingdom Auditing Standards.

We report to you our opinion as to whether the financial statements give a true and fair view and are properly prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 1985. We also report to you if, in our opinion, the Council's Report is not consistent with the financial statements, if the company has not kept proper accounting records, if we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit, or if information specified by law regarding Council members' remuneration and transactions with the Company is not disclosed.

We read the Council's Report and consider the implications for our report if we become aware of any apparent misstatements within it.

Basis of audit opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with United Kingdom Auditing Standards issued by the Auditing Practices Board. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. It also includes an assessment of the significant estimates and judgments made by the Council in the preparation of the financial statements, and of whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the Company's circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

We planned and performed our audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which we considered necessary in order to provide us with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or other irregularity or error. In forming our opinion we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.

Opinion

In our opinion the financial statements give a true and fair view of the state of the Company's affairs as at 31 December 2002 and of its results for the year then ended and have been properly prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 1985.

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Companies Act 1985, the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective June 2002) and applicable accounting standards and having regard to the Statement of Recommended Practice for Charities insofar as considered appropriate to the Campaign's operations.

The financial statements do not deal with any funds under the control of CND Representative Organisations. These are defined in the Campaign's constitution as CND national organisations, regional organisations, groups and specialist sections. All such organisations are entirely autonomous in their funding and decision-making. Details of transactions with these organisations are given in Note 12.

The effect of events relating to the year ended 31 December 2002 which occurred before the date of approval of the financial statements by the Council have been included in the financial statements to the extent required to show a true and fair view of the state of affairs at 31 December 2002 and of the results for the year ended on that date.

Income Recognition

Income from membership subscriptions is accounted for on a cash received basis. Donations are also accounted for on a cash basis except where received in response to a specific appeal. Such donations are recognised at the earlier of receipt or when the costs to be funded are defrayed. Legacy income is recognised when it is reasonably certain that a legacy will be received and the amount receivable can be reliably measured. Peace education income is recognised to the extent that it has been expended; unexpended amounts are carried forward as deferred income - see Note 2. All other income is accounted for on the accruals basis.

Investments

Investments are stated at year-end market value.

Depreciation

Depreciation has been computed so as to write off the cost of tangible fixed assets (equipment, furniture and fixtures) evenly over their expected useful lives of 4 - 8 years.

Stocks

Stocks of materials and merchandise for sale are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

The balance represents donations received since the year-end for the Campaign's Legal challenge appeal. These donations have been recognised because the full expected costs of the Legal challenge to the Government during the year have also been recognised in the Income and Expenditure Account.

At the year end the Campaign had been notified of entitlement to various legacies which are expected to be received in due course. At present there is no material indication how much is going to be received from these legacies.

The deficits for the year shown above are respectively the deficit for the year on the Income and Expenditure Account before transfers, charged to the Accumulated surplus, and the loss on revaluation of investments shown in the Statement of Total Recognised Gains and Losses on page 7, charged to the General reserve. The General reserve was set up to allow an orderly wind-down of the Campaign, should this ever become necessary, and should be used for this purpose only. The Balance in the reserve is maintained at approximately three month's expenditure. The investment loss has been charged to the General reserve since the investments concerned were made from that reserve.

The purpose of the Fixed assets reserve is to reflect the Campaign's funds which are tied up in fixed assets and therefore not available for spending on other purposes. The balance is set to equate to the net book value of fixed assets at the year-end and a transfer has been made from the Accumulated surplus for this purpose.

12. TRANSACTIONS WITH OTHER CND ORGANISATIONS

The Campaign makes grants to regional CND organisations and specialist sections and the totals given are shown in Note 5. The grants to regions are principally towards the cost of staff employed by the regional organisations.

The Campaign pays to CND Cymru and CND Scotland a proportion of legacies received based respectively on Welsh and Scottish members as a proportion of Campaign membership - less a deduction for the proportionate share of legacies received by those organisations. The net amounts payable, respectively of £1,713 (2001 - £4,944) and £471 (2001 - £7,499), are deducted from the Legacies income shown in the Income and Expenditure Account.

The Campaign also pays to CND Cymru and CND Scotland the subscriptions received from members who have moved respectively to Wales and Scotland (less a deduction for members moving the other way). The net amounts concerned, respectively £3,179 (2001 - £3,284) and £2,054 (2001 - £1,882), are deducted from the National membership subscriptions income shown in the Income and Expenditure Account.

All amounts due were paid by the year end except for the membership and legacy income share-outs which are paid in arrears.

As explained in Note 1 all these other CND organisations are completely autonomous and organisationally separate from the Campaign.
