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LEGAL AND ADMINISTRATION

Every company member undertakes to contribute to its assets in the event of it being wound up while s/he is a member such amount as may be required not exceeding $\pounds 1$.

The Campaign is governed by an elected Council with policy decided by an Annual Conference of members. As well as the central organisation - which campaigns throughout England - there are a number of other CND organisations working regionally or in specialist areas. These organisations are entirely autonomous in their funding and decision-making and hence are not dealt with in these financial statements.

COUNCIL'S REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2004

The Council (which is the board of directors for company law purposes) presents its report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2004.

OBJECTS

The Campaign seeks nuclear disarmament by Britain and worldwide and to promote and advance the welfare of the human community by working for international peace and disarmament and a world in which the vast resources devoted to militarism are redirected to the real needs of the planet and the human community.

POLICIES ADOPTED

Its principal campaigning activities are to inform, educate and lobby to achieve its objects. CND publishes periodicals and reports; it sends regular briefings to and meets with MPs; it lobbies UK ministers, ambassadors, diplomats, academics and opinion formers, both in person and by letter; it informs and educates its members and encourages them to take action; it holds street stalls and exhibitions, and distributes leaflets and other materials, to inform the public on nuclear issues; it sends representatives to international disarmament conferences; it maintains contact and liaises with other organisations including regional and local groups within the UK, like-minded organisations in Europe and elsewhere, and specialist and expert organisations worldwide; it produces a schools pack, other educational materials, and provides speakers. At all times, it informs the media about its activities.

ORGANISATION OF THE CAMPAIGN

CND's annual conference is the policy-making body, establishes CND's strategy and sets priorities for the coming year. CND Council is the Board of Directors and is responsible for the implementation of policy as set by the Conference and meets three times a year. It monitors CND's finances and makes major financial decisions. Fifteen members of Council are directly elected by the AGM, and there are also representatives from the regions and specialist sections, as defined in Part 2 of CND's Regulations.

CND's staff work as a team, under the guidance of the Administration and Finance Group, and the Campaigns Group, which both meet four times a year. The Administration and Finance Group monitors financial performance against the budget, oversees fundraising, ensures that financial systems and controls are being followed and sets the budgets, including considering any amendments to the budgets, which are then approved by Council. It reports to Council. The Campaigns Group considers the details of campaigning programmes and ensures their integration with membership, fundraising and international work.

COUNCIL'S REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2004

REVIEW OF PROGRESS AND ACHIEVEMENTS

For much of the year CND campaigned on its core objectives of opposing the UK Trident nuclear weapons system and working towards global nuclear disarmament. Opposition to Trident was promoted by arranging a public meeting and demonstration at Devonport, where Trident submarines undergo their re-fit, and supporting Trident Ploughshares (TP) activities around the base. In addition, CND continued its support for Scottish CND and TP with the Big Blockade at Faslane, where the weapons are based, in August. A recent UK concern is the research and development of new nuclear weapons at AWE Aldermaston and CND jointly organised, with Aldermaston Women's Peace Camp and Slough for Peace, a highly successful march from London to Aldermaston over Easter to highlight this. As part of the work on global abolition of nuclear weapons, CND attended the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT) preparatory committee in New York in May and widely distributed information on the UK's record on nuclear disarmament. CND held a fringe meeting on vertical proliferation and joined other NGOs in calling for real progress towards nuclear disarmament. This was reinforced by visits to Embassies in the UK and an adjournment debate in Parliament thanks to our very active MPs.

Campaigning against Missile Defence (Star Wars) continued during the year with a major blockade of the Menwith Hill spy and Star Wars base in North Yorkshire. A sponsored walk between Menwith Hill and Fylingdales between Hiroshima and Nagasaki days received good media coverage. Briefings and other campaigning materials were produced including a detailed report on space weapons launched publicly in the press and Parliament, along with the results of a CND commissioned ICM poll indicating that 70% of the public think space weapons should be banned. Another demo, supported by Thom Yorke of Radiohead, took place at Fylingdales during Keep Space for Peace Week and was well attended. Yorkshire CND, on behalf of CND, continues to work actively in this area.

On the international front, a delegation was sent to Japan for the Hiroshima commemoration and CND continues to develop its international contacts with European, Asian and US peace groups. CND made a significant contribution to the European Social Forum in London in October, attended by 25,000 activists, putting nuclear weapons onto the agenda. A highlight was a live telephone link up with Mordechai Vanunu. CND remains concerned with international nuclear issues and has issued statements, produced briefings and written letters on Iran and North Korea.

CND continued to work with Stop the War Coalition and the Muslim Association of Britain on activities related to the Iraq War and encourages these organisations to participate in CND events. NATO and its nuclear policy is also a target. Representatives have attended several international meetings. A briefing was written on Depleted Uranium and CND remains concerned about the security and environmental impact of waste from nuclear power stations.

Lobbying, letter writing, street campaigning, blockades, local meetings and parliamentary meetings have all been employed on CND campaigns. Much activity took place at local level, increasing awareness of and interest in peace issues and CND. CND assists local groups and activists through the provision of advice, encouragement, leaflets and other campaigning materials and the CND website continues to develop, providing up to date information on all activities. CND continues to work with its supporters in Parliament. It maintains regular contact with MPs, raises issues of concern and produces briefings, and seeks to influence the policy-making processes of the political parties and trade unions. CND lobbied and organised an event at the Labour Party Conference in collaboration with Labour CND, and participated in TUC and trade union conferences.

Membership and fundraising activities have been boosted by the support of a number of musical and entertainment celebrities, who have been notably vocal in their opposition to the war in Iraq but also support CND's core campaigns.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

Campaigning will continue on Trident at Devonport and Faslane, on new nuclear weapons at Aldermaston and on Star Wars in Yorkshire. 2005 sees the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty Review Conference in New York and CND will be highlighting the hypocrisy of the nuclear weapons states in not working towards their disarmament obligations whilst demanding compliance of other States over proliferation, making the world a more dangerous place. The coming year also sees the 60th anniversary of the dropping of the atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki. This provides a theme for many events in the forthcoming year entitled 'Countdown to Hiroshima', linking many of CND's different campaigning objectives to the event that started it all.

CND will continue to organise a broad range of activities involving its staff, regions, groups and members, with actions at places related to nuclear issues. It will send representatives to international conferences, political party conferences, trade union conferences and many other events. It will continue to work with other campaigning organisations and groups to achieve its objectives, and fulfil its conference decisions.

CND's efforts on fundraising and membership recruitment will continue. Fundraising, recruitment and profile raising will be maintained through CND's presence at festivals and events as well as through campaigning activities. Efforts to establish a charitable trust to support educational work will continue.

COUNCIL'S REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2004

CND is committed to maximise to the full its use of its resources, including its staff, members, and investment in information technology equipment. It will continue to develop its publications, especially its website (<u>www.cnduk.org</u>).

VOLUNTARY HELP AND DONATIONS IN KIND

CND is very grateful to a large number of volunteers, both in the National Office and in regional offices, who put in large amounts of work. All the Officers are volunteers, despite the time commitment entailed, and many regional offices are run entirely by volunteers. While all volunteers are entitled to claim travel and lunch expenses many do not do so, or claim only a small percentage. Equally many do not claim reimbursement of telephone, postal and other expenses incurred when working from their homes. These contributions are invaluable and much appreciated. CND is also particularly appreciative of the fundraising efforts of local groups and of the legacies it has received from supporters.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The results of the year's operation are set out in the attached financial statements. The retained reserves at 31 December 2004 amount to £279,415.

STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE PREPARATION OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The Council is required by law to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the financial activities of the Company and of the income and expenditure of the Company for that year. In preparing those financial statements the Council is required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently,
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements, and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Company will continue in business.

The Council is responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Company and enable it to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. It is also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

PREPARATION OF THE REPORT

This report has been prepared in accordance with the provisions of Part VII of the Companies Act 1985 relating to small companies.

AUDITORS

The auditors, Gotham Erskine, have indicated their willingness to continue in office and offer themselves for re-appointment at the next Annual General Meeting.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF

CAMPAIGN FOR NUCLEAR DISARMAMENT

We have audited the financial statements of the Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament for the year ended 31 December 2004 set out on pages 6 to 14. 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Companies Act 1985, the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective June 2002) and applicable accounting standards and having regard to the Statement of Recommended Practice for Charities insofar as considered appropriate to the Campaign's operations.

The financial statements do not deal with any funds under the control of CND Representative Organisations. These are defined in the Campaign's constitution as CND national organisations, regional organisations, groups and specialist sections. All such organisations are entirely autonomous in their funding and decision-making. Details of transactions with these organisations are given in Note 13.

The effect of events relating to the year ended 31 December 2004 which occurred before the date of approval of the financial statements by the Council have been included in the financial statements to the extent required to show a true and fair view of the state of affairs at 31 December 2004 and of the results for the year ended on that date.

Income recognition

Income from membership subscriptions is accounted for on a cash received basis. Donations are also accounted for on a cash basis except where received in response to a specific appeal. Such donations are recognised when the costs to be funded are defrayed. Legacy income is recognised when it is reasonably certain that a legacy will be received and the amount receivable can be reliably measured. All other income is accounted for on the accruals basis.

Investments

Investments are stated at year-end market value.

Depreciation

All assets costing more than \pounds 500 are capitalised. Depreciation has been computed so as to write off the cost of tangible fixed assets (equipment, furniture and fixtures) evenly over their expected useful lives of 4 - 8 years.

Stocks

Stocks of materials and merchandise for sale are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

The surpluses for the year shown above are respectively the surplus for the year on the Income and Expenditure Account before transfers, credited to the Accumulated surplus, and the gain on revaluation of investments shown in the Statement of Total Recognised Gains and Losses on page 7, credited to the General reserve. The General reserve was set up to allow an orderly wind-down of the Campaign, should this ever become necessary, and should be used for this purpose only. The Balance in the reserve is maintained at approximately three month's expenditure. Investment gains and losses are credited or charged to the General reserve since the investments concerned were made from that reserve.

The purpose of the Fixed assets reserve is to reflect the Campaign's funds which are tied up in fixed assets and therefore not available for spending on other purposes. The year-end balance has been set to equate to the net book value of fixed assets, plus approximately \pounds 7,600 for a new photocopier (see Note 6) and \pounds 7,000 to fund new computer equipment expected to be purchased in 2005.

13. TRANSACTIONS WITH OTHER CND ORGANISATIONS

The Campaign makes grants to regional CND organisations and specialist sections and the totals given are shown in Note 5. Grants to Yorkshire CND and Greater Manchester CND are principally towards the costs of staff employed by those organisations.

During the year the Treasurer of Ex Services CND was ill and the organisation asked the Campaign to administer funds, including a £13,300 legacy received by the organisation, on its behalf. A total of £15,082 was received by the Campaign; £618 of costs were incurred on behalf of Ex Services CND and £4,574 was retained as donations for specified costs of the Campaign authorised by the organisation, leaving a year-end balance held amounting to £9,890 included under Other creditors (see Note 10).

The Campaign pays to CND Cymru and CND Scotland a proportion of legacies received based respectively on Welsh and Scottish members as a proportion of Campaign membership - less a deduction for the proportionate share of legacies received by those organisations. The net amounts payable, respectively of $\pounds 5,687$ (2003 - $\pounds 2,059$) and $\pounds 9,390$ (2003 - $\pounds 3,055$), are deducted from the Legacies income shown in the Income and Expenditure Account.

The Campaign also pays to CND Cymru and CND Scotland the subscriptions received from members who have moved respectively to Wales and Scotland (less a deduction for members moving the other way). The net amounts concerned, respectively \pounds 3,561 (2003 - \pounds 3,110) and \pounds 2,213 (2003 - \pounds 2,018), are deducted from the Membership subscriptions income shown in Note 2.

All amounts due were paid by the year end except for the membership and legacy income share-outs which are paid in arrears.

As explained in Note 1 all these other CND organisations are completely autonomous and organisationally separate from the Campaign.
